Behaviour Policy – Ladybird Manor

1. Purpose

This policy outlines Ladybird Manor's approach to behaviour for learners with Severe Learning Difficulties (SLD) across Key Stages 1–4. Behaviour is understood as a form of communication, not a primary function. Our aim is to create a safe, supportive environment where learners can express themselves and develop positive strategies for communication and self-regulation.

2. Principles

- Behaviour is **communicative** and reflects unmet needs, sensory processing differences, or emotional states.
- Responses are **proactive, preventative, and restorative**, never punitive.
- All strategies respect **dignity, rights, and safeguarding principles**.
- Behaviour support is embedded within the **Equals Semi-Formal Pathway** and linked to EHCP outcomes.

3. Aims

- Promote positive behaviour through structured routines and clear expectations.
- Reduce anxiety and behaviours that challenge by:
 - Providing predictable environments
 - Using personalised communication systems (AAC, Makaton, visuals)
- Teach alternative skills for communication and self-regulation.

4. Core Strategies

- **Positive Behaviour Support (PBS):**
 - Individual PBS plans for learners with identified needs.
 - Functional Behaviour Assessments to identify triggers and functions of behaviour.
 - Strategies include proactive environmental adjustments, teaching replacement behaviours, and reinforcement.
- **Communication First:**
 - Ensure learners have access to AAC, Makaton, and visual supports.
- **Sensory Regulation:**
 - Provide sensory breaks, calming spaces, and personalised sensory diets.

- **Consistency:**
 - Shared language and routines across staff teams.

5. Behaviour Expectations

- Expectations are **individualised** and linked to EHCP outcomes.
- Visual supports (Now/Next boards, social stories) clarify expectations.
- Positive reinforcement through praise, token systems, or preferred activities.

6. Responses to Behaviour

- **Low-Level:**
 - Redirect, offer choices, use calming strategies.
- **Escalation:**
 - Remove triggers, provide safe space, follow de-escalation scripts.
- **Post-Incident:**
 - Reflective practice, restorative conversation (adapted for SLD), update PBS plan.

7. Physical Intervention

- Used **only as a last resort** when:
 - There is an immediate risk of harm to the learner or others.
 - All de-escalation strategies have been exhausted.
- **PRICE Training:**
 - All staff trained in PRICE (Protecting Rights in a Caring Environment).
 - Interventions are proportionate, necessary, and recorded.
- **Post-Incident Review:**
 - Debrief with staff and learner (where appropriate).
 - Update PBS plan and risk assessment.

8. Recording & Monitoring

- All incidents logged in **Evidence for Learning**.
- Progress tracked against:
 - **Semi-Formal Pathway learning intentions**
 - **EHCP outcomes**
 - **MAPP dimensions** (Prompting, Fluency, Maintenance, Generalisation)
- Regular review of PBS plans with multidisciplinary input.

9. Staff Training

- Mandatory training in:
 - Positive Behaviour Support
 - Communication strategies
 - Sensory regulation
 - PRICE physical intervention
 - Safeguarding and dignity in care

10. Links to Curriculum

- Behaviour teaching embedded in:
 - **My Communication** (social interaction)
 - **My Independence** (self-regulation)
 - **PSHE** (emotional wellbeing, relationships)

11. Partnership with Families

- Collaborative approach with parents/carers.
- Share strategies and progress through regular communication and reviews.
